

Resident alien or other eligible non-citizen: A personwho is not a citizen or national of the United Statesandwho has been admitted as a legal immigrant for the purpose of obtaining permanent esident alien status (and who holds either an alien registration card [Form I-551 or I-151], a Temporary Resident Card [Form I-688], or an Arrival-Departure Record [Form I-94] with a notation that conveys legal immigrant status, such as Section 207 Refugee, Section 208 Asylee, Conditional Entrant Parolee or Cuban-Haitian).

Room and board (charges)—on campus: Assumedoubleoccupancyin institutional housing and 19 mealsper week (or maximum meal plan).

Semester calendar system: A calendar systemthat consistsof two semesters uring the academic year with about 16 weeks for each semester of instruction. There may be an additional summer session.

Talent/ability (as admission factor): Specialconsideratiorgiven to students with demonstrate dalent/abilities in areas of interest to the institution (e.g., sports, the arts, languages, etc.).

Teacher certification program: Programdesigned to preparestudents to meet the requirements for certification as teachers in elementary, middle/junior high, and secondary schools.

Transfer applicant: An individual who hasfulfilled the requirements to be considered or admission (including paymen or waiving of the application fee, if any) and who has previously attended another college or university and earned college-le

Transfer student: A studententering the institution for the first time but known to have previously attended a postsecondal institution at the same level (e.g., undergraduate). The student may transfer with or without credit.

Transportation (costs): Assumetwo roundtrips to and from your institution for commuter students.

Trimester calendar system: An academic year consisting of 3 terms of about 15 weeks each.

Tuition: Amount of money charged to students for instructional services. Tuition may be charged per term, per course, or pe

*Tutoring: May rangefrom one-on-oneutoring in specific subjects to tutoring in an areasuch as math, reading, or writing. Most tutors are college students; at some colleges, they are specially trained and certified.
