AUDITING COURSES**

This term is used to characterize courses taken under audit privileges and does not represent a course taken for a grade or credit. Auditing a course allows a student to attend classes and participate in discussions without the pressures of taking examinations, writing papers, or fulfilling other requirements generally associated with earning credit.

An audited course is reported on the student's record with the designation AU. No credit is awarded for the course. It cannot be used to satisfy graduation requirements nor is it considered in computing the grade point average. Standard tuition and fees apply.

Audit privileges may not be changed to credit status. Audit privileges are ordinarily limited to one course per semester.

Students who audit must be officially admitted to the University. With the consent of the course instructor and the Office of the Registrar, a student may be admitted as an auditor if space is available.
